<u>Satellite clubs</u> offer members and prospective members a way to create a new club experience together, as a smaller group supported by an established local club. This club type needs fewer members to get started and helps people get exactly what they want out of Rotary. All satellite clubs begin as an offshoot of one or more Rotary clubs. They have a sponsor club that serves as the governing body of the satellite club. Some satellite clubs eventually become independent Rotary clubs, while others enjoy the support of their sponsor club and prefer to remain a satellite club. One of the great advantages of starting a satellite club is gaining from the experience and encouragement of an established club while only needing 8 members to launch.



Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fully funded fellowships for dedicated leaders from around the world to study at one of our peace centers.

Since the program began in 2002, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,700 fellows who now work in over 140 countries.

## **Rotary History:**

with the chartering of the Rotary Club of London. Rotary had already become international in April of that year when the Rotary Club of Winnipeg, Manitoba, was chartered, but the club on a different continent earned Rotary the distinction of being an intercontinental organization. Delegates to the 1922 Rotary Convention shortened the name to Rotary International and approved the creation of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland. They also introduced to the Rotary constitution the Object of Rotary, which remains one of our guiding principles.

In August 1912, Rotary crossed the Atlantic
