ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE BUILDS PEACE ONE YOUNG PERSON AT A TIME.

Students learn a new language, discover another culture, and truly become global citizens. Exchanges for students ages 15-19 are sponsored by Rotary clubs in more than 100 countries.

Rotary History in Peace

During World War II, Rotary members looked for ways to create a stable and peaceful world. In 1940, convention delegates adopted a statement, <u>Rotary Amid World Conflict</u>, which emphasized that "where freedom, justice, truth, sanctity of the pledged word, and respect for human rights do not exist, Rotary cannot live nor its ideal prevail." Walter D. Head, then Rotary International's president, remarked that there must be a better way to settle international differences than violence and called on Rotarians to find it.

The Rotarian magazine ran essays by authors, politicians, and other well-known figures that encouraged discussion on the topic of peace. Rotary published collections of these essays as "A World to Live In" (1942) and "Peace Is a Process" (1944). Recognizing that the end of the war didn't eliminate the need to discuss these topics, Rotary continued the series with "Peace Demands Action" in 1947.
